Yet, God strategically moved us to bring shalom to the chaos, protecting us to continue to do ministry despite all the challenges. We stood beside our brothers and sisters in Christ, showing the power of being present in daily life. When the U.N. reports 2.9 million people in catastrophic hunger, we feed young mothers and infant children. When an average of four kidnappings happen each day, we are love in action, standing in the hard places and pointing to the good. God strategically built us to last in the most desperate of times and moved the pieces for us to continue to serve. Just look at the following numbers, and the numbers in this year-end review:

Held Concerts for Hope for **2,500** marginalized people in Central Iowa

Signed a lease for a fifth thrift store with the location
to be announced soon

Expanded our school by adding 4th grade, bringing the total to **167 students**

Supplied over **225,000 pounds of food,** grown or purchased from Haiti

Praise God from whom all blessings flow for these amazing accomplishments! We do this together, the givers and the doers, to be love in action in our broken world. We thank you for your generosity, allowing us to be generous to others in return. It is truly a blessing to do this work together.

Moving into 2023, the one-word God is giving us is stretch. The definition God has given us is to extend in breadth; to expand; to spread. I'm taken to the Jesus story in Matthew 12, Mark 3, and Luke 6, where he healed a man with a shriveled hand on the Sabbath. Jesus asked the man to stretch out his hand, and Jesus completely restored him. In doing so, Jesus did more than anyone thought was possible – both in the physical healing and the day he did it on, the Sabbath. This year, we've heard God say to us, "Stretch out your hand" in some very difficult situations: Places where brokenness is evident for all to shun. Places we've been told are impossible to change. 2022 BY THE NUMBERS

Blessed other lowa-based non-profits with over \$25,000 worth of resources

Staffed jobs for **92 Haitian people** with Many Hands, providing much-needed income

Fed over **3,000 plates of food** each day in our school feeding programs for **19 schools**

Married 21 couples, bringing our total to 167

Provided daily food, medical assistance, spiritual guidance, and educational opportunities for over 400 mothers and children under the age of 2

Planted 1,000 banana trees and grew around 36,000 pounds of food for the area

Performed over 1,500 goat health checks and distributed 87 pregnant goats

Hosted two IMPACT Weekend retreats for individuals, deepening faith and understanding of each person's unique call in the Body of Christ

Led two groups of Many Hands staff through Lead Like Jesus training

Performed world-class teacher training for **29 teachers**

Added four missionaries in Haiti and Abaco

Built 10 homes for families

Held over **20 weekly Bible study groups** in multiple communities

Added clothing baling operations for our Metro Stores

Encouraged all staff through daily devotions

Established partnerships with Bahamian and Haitian pastors, government officials, and community leaders

Upgraded our Point-of-Sale systems in our thrift stores

Concerts of Hope



This year, we desired to expand the influence of the Business Breakfast, bringing Love in Action to those around us. Partnering with composer Eric Genuis, Many Hands hosted the Week of Impact, a series of 15 Concerts of Hope reaching 2,500 people across Iowa. We went to prisons, rehab centers, urban schools, nursing homes, funeral homes, churches, and youth shelters. The final concert took place at the Business Breakfast for over 300 business leaders.

Igniting Generosity Through Thrift

This year saw our Thrift stores continue their trend of best-in-class retail stores. Each of our four locations received award honors, including Best Thrift Store and Best Nonprofit in the CityView Best of DSM, Best Retailer in the Best of the West awards, Best Retail Store in the Urbandale Chamber Best in Class, and Best Thrift Store in the SRG People's Choice awards.



Our staff continues to be love in action through these stores, igniting generosity in the communities they serve.

School and Programs Continue in Haiti

In September, construction for the School of Light was completed. The new building added three classrooms for our grade school. Though schools were delayed throughout the country, we resumed classes in October, enrolling 167 students.

Our Love in Action programs in Sylvain, Maliarette, and Jean Boule, have continued to operate with little interruption. The nationwide gas shortage continues to hinder logistics. Still, our staff has overcome these hurdles to ensure 400 families are cared for physically and spiritually every day.








EXPANDING TO THE BAHAMAS

Many Hands recently announced its plans to expand into a new country. We were invited to start our community-based initiatives in the Bahamas to serve Haitian and low-income Bahamian communities. The Bahamas is still recovering from Hurricane Dorian, which hit in 2019. The country also sees an influx of Haitian refugees fleeing a worsening Haiti crisis. With thousands of Haitians now facing hardships outside of Haiti, we have felt God's call to reach these populations.

Initially, our expansion will focus on restarting IMPACT trips, enabling people to serve the people of Haiti and the Bahamas on the island of Grand Abaco. Our first IMPACT teams will be boots on the ground starting January 2023

Many Hands is continuing to grow into new communities in Haiti. In 2022 we added Me Bèl Mèr as a fourth area for our work, establishing a presence in this isolated community. With land purchased and initial minor construction complete, Many Hands aims to establish a new Love-in-Action Center by late 2023. This center will allow us to start the First 1,000 Days program for families in the zone, combating malnutrition and poverty.
