Reflecting back on 2023, there is much to be thankful for in the work God has accomplished through us. Coming into this year, the word spoken over the organization was stretch, and that word has proven to be prophetic for the year.

As a whole, we've been stretched more this year than in any previous year. Haiti's troubles have continued to deepen, yet God made a way for us to provide more dayto-day help to people in need through our Stretch Out Your Hand campaign and opening a new Love-in-Action center in rural Mè Bel Mè. We officially launched Impact teams to Abaco, Bahamas, and walked with nearly 200 people desiring to be transformed by God in community with others. We also grew in our community development in Abaco, rebuilding an entire community center and launching new programs in the public schools for hundreds of kids. On the Thrift side, we opened a new store in Indianola, lowa, as well as updated systems and processes to be able to meet the growing demand for the services we offer in our other four store locations.

Our reach grows daily, as the Lord continues to provide His daily bread to each of us, even when it looks like we

can't stretch anymore. He is faithful through it all, and we are thankful we can be a tool in the hands of an Amazing Sculptor. When looking at all we have accomplished throughout the year, we stand in awe of the amazing achievements and firm confirmations that Many Hands holds. The numbers show that, regardless of the turmoil that persists in the world today, our convictions remain solid. We are faithfully called to be Love in Action in our broken world.

I hope this encourages you to see good things are still happening. All is not lost, even during the most troubling times in our world. We stand against the darkness to light a path towards God for others to follow. We cannot do this alone, and we thank you for your generosity and continued stewardship of dollars to us. It is truly a blessing to do this work together.

Moving into 2024, the one-word God is giving us is selah. Now, this might not be a word you are familiar with, so let me explain this prophetic word God has given me. Selah is as mysterious as it is beautiful because there is no direct translation, but rather, it is transliterated. Taken from Psalms, it can mean to pause or contemplate. Taken from Kings, it also can mean a rock or strong fortress to be exalted. Another transliteration would lean towards its meaning as forever or everlasting. As I prayed for this year's word, God revealed selah to me. For this year, we are to take a breath, a pause for contemplation while we solidify the organization as a rock and strong fortress for the Lord in the years to come. He isn't building something for next year, but for eternity, as we point to something greater than ourselves. We are humbled by your years of giving, volunteering, and prayers, which keep us going in those challenging moments. We ask for you to not be discouraged because we see God working through us in so many encouraging ways. We do this together as each of us plays a role in the Body of Christ to bring shalom to the chaos.

THE JOURNEY IS IN THE OBEDIENCE Many Hands' Board Visits Abaco

In November, the Many Hands board traveled back to Abaco, a year since their last visit. The board spent critical time getting a first-hand look at work on the ground and dreaming about what is possible. Led by CEO Tim Brand, they held strategic meetings and prayer, reviewed the foundations the Abaco team has laid, and considered what God is calling our organization to do in 2024.

The board met with the government, which has actively supported Many Hands. Tim Brand led conversations with key government officials, who shared their insights into the education, food insecurity, and housing issues facing the people of Abaco. Delving deeper into these gave the board essential insights into the ways Many Hands can develop our key programs.

The board also spent time in the community, meeting with local leaders to uncover families' daily challenges, aiming to see how Many Hands can best come alongside Murphy Town, empowering and equipping the community. They also visited local Bahamian and Haitian families, sharing conversation, prayer, and gifts of much-needed food.

Kendra Meyer, a medical specialist on the Many Hands board, shared her insights from the trip. Kendra was reminded of God's love and the hope in the community. "Alongside my dear friends on the Many Hands Board of Directors, we observed and we led. We laughed, we cried. We listened, we guided, and we dreamed. But most importantly, we heard stories and prayed with the people of Abaco. While the healing here is far from finished, we saw light, and we plan to walk with this community."

The board felt that the trip solidified God's call on Many Hands in Abaco. One thing became clear: God has moved ahead and prepared the way. Kendra believes we are called to listen and act on His call.

"We know we cannot fix the ways of the world, but we are reminded of a God who can. We can be a highway of His love," shared Kendra. "The good works we do won't earn us God's love. But rather, we work with Him and let His love transform us. The journey is in the obedience."

Kendra and the board hope that many will hear God's call to support the work being done in Abaco.

"As we continue our walk in Abaco, come, volunteer with us and support our work! We have teams booking through 2024, including one of my own. We invite you to partner in our programs."

GOD'S GOT IT! Christi Gabhart's Road to Recovery

Christi Gabhart, U.S. Lead of Ministry and Benevolence in Haiti, was diagnosed with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL) in August 2022. CLL is often a slow-progressing cancer. Living and working in Haiti poses its own challenges with medical care, which is why she has chosen to start the treatment for CLL at this time.

Here is an update from Christi on her treatment:

In mid-September, Craig and I returned stateside to see family and have some medical checkups. My blood work shows a white blood cell count that is too high. After a CT Scan and a meeting with the oncologist, and considering our individual life circumstances, we have decided that I will take chemotherapy treatment to get this in check. I started on Oct 18.

My experience the past 2 months has been one of feeling the love and support of so many faithful friends, stateside and in Haiti, praying very specifically for me in the middle of chemotherapy treatment.

After ONE round of treatment, I had already seen and felt tremendous improvement. At the beginning of round two, the oncologist reported the results of the blood test that all the 'levels' were already back in range of what they should be. So God's GOT IT! Up to this time, the side effects have been minimal, with some low days but not lasting long at all. I have had normal energy, good sleep

for the most part, and not too many issues with food. I have heard people comment on having 'Chemo Brain," and I say, I am just NOT going there!

I have been able to continue to collaborate with Haitian staff through messaging and WhatsApp calls. And each time, I receive such encouragement. The hardest part is that Craig is there 'spinning all the plates'. The Haitian staff are doing SUCH good work; there is just a LOT going on!

We don't have anything official, but I am very hopeful to think I might be able to resume my part of the work in Haiti possibly by the end of January. The time this has allowed me to be together with family has been so good. I am grateful for every moment. I am thankful for the hospitality and a place to live temporarily.

I ask for continued prayer and that can include prayers of Thanksgiving.

LOVE IN ACTION UNDERWAY AT MÈ BEL MÈ

The First 1,000 Days program is underway at our newest Love-in-Action center in Mè Bel Mè, and the benefits have already provided hope for many in the area.

The community's response has been overwhelmingly positive since the dedication of the center in June, and there were many applicants eager to lend their support to Many Hands' mission. The goal is to provide life-transforming programs to 90 families in the first year of operation. The center is now serving 17 families in the Mè Bel Mè community with four new moms joining monthly. The population of Mè Bel Mè testifies that for the first time in their lives, they have access to a nice building with a sustainable program.

Many mothers, like Noel Islande, have felt the support that this center provides to the community. "I am pregnant, and without MH4H, I don't know what I would do with the difficult situation that we are facing now," Noel says. "My husband left my house because he did not know what to do about the food situation. More than that, they (MH4H) pay for the medicine for me."

Many Hands has been faithfully building relationships in the community of Mè Bel Mè for several months and has committed to performing home visits regularly to share the gospel and connect with community members. This initiative has had great success, seeing eight restorations of faith and seven new souls for Jesus. Phanord

Wilnise, the Spiritual Mother for the Mè Bel Mè center, shares that she thanks God for the center He provided for the community and hopes that she can spread the good news of Jesus to the people. "My vision is to see all the people in the zone hear the good news of Jesus and change their lives," Phanord says.

Monette Dehilaire, the midwife for the center of Mé Bel Mè, shared a story that highlights the personal impact we are seeing for new mothers.

"There was a mom who was suffering from high blood pressure. The first time I met her, she was very stressed and worried, afraid of losing her baby. I educated her, encouraged her, and let her know everything would be in place if she [followed] the First 1,000 Days program."

Because of the program and the relationship she built with this mother, Monette was able to direct her to the medical attention she needed. "She visited a doctor, she had tests, exams, and a sonogram. She now has medicine that has lowered her blood pressure, and the baby is now safely born. The mother said she is content with being in our program and happy to be part of the church."

This Love-in-Action center has provided a lifeline to the community of Mè Bel Mè, and Many Hands is committed to uplifting the families in the area for years to come.


